## Dirktionary entry

**D**irktional definition and/or graphical representation of a word that an associate of Dirk Geeraerts links to him.

The prototypical "Dirktionary" entry is handwritten, because of Dirk's appreciation of good penmanship, defines a clear word or expression and is signed by its author.

Just like classically defined categories are difficult to come by in the wild, the entries collected in this book cannot all be described with a set of necessary and sufficient conditions — other than that they are collected in this book.

Some entries may be printed, or don't have a headword. More variation can be found in the languages these words come from, in the handwriting styles and even in the orientation of the text.

Organizing a project in 2020 was not without its challenges, but that didn't stop this book from seeing the light. Dozens of researchers from all over the world sent their words and their thoughts, in an explosion of creativity, fueled by admiration.
